

Progress Report: June 2015

For 19 years, Comprehensive Strategy has been collecting and compiling data to provide the Siouxland area with a tool to track risk factors for youth problem behaviors in our community. This report provides the newest data available for 2015.

YOUTH PROBLEM BEHAVIORS are Substance Abuse, Delinquency, Teen Pregnancy, School Dropout, and Violence. Years of local, state, and national research indicate that these five youth problem behaviors interfere with positive youth development.

RISK FACTORS are research-based conditions that increase the likelihood that a child will develop one or more behavioral problems in adolescence. Priority risks for this community were identified, and data used to track those risks are included in this report.



Teen Pregnancy Woodbury County and Iowa





Teen Pregnancy Dakota County and Nebraska






Past 30-Day Usage by 12th Graders


